WHY THE STAKES COULDN'T BE HIGHER

It's an unfortunate reality that most church building projects end up with serious complications that ultimately hinder their successful completion. In fact, fewer than half of church building projects even get past the design stage. Only about 10% of projects that are started by churches actually reach completion without any significant issues.

The reason for this staggering statistic varies, but most often it is a lack of thoughtful, thorough planning in the beginning that sets the stage for problems later in the project. But there are ways to avoid the common pitfalls that so many churches face. In fact, we've developed these **5 Keys to Successful Building Projects** for churches and non-profit organizations who are looking to build or upgrade their facilities.

1) Let your ministry vision guide your planning

2) Take a realistic look at your resources




2) Take a realistic look at your resources

What can we afford? The answer may surprise you.

Just taking into account current assets and liabilities, you may feel confident in a budget for your building project. But things like loan interest rates, the cost of construction labor, or the ever-changing fluctuations in the cost of materials can cause significant shifts in what is feasible for your church. And once your project is finished, ongoing maintenance costs must be factored into your budget as well.

Taking an honest look at all aspects of a project and the potential costs involved is a crucial step in understanding what you can afford before you begin designing your facility. We generally suggest taking a thorough look at your current budget as well as having a preliminary conversation with a bank if you plan on financing part of your building project.

3) Develop a Master Plan and Execute In Phases



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There are dangers in both starting too big and in dreaming too small. Many churches attempt to execute a large-scale building project all at once, almost guaranteeing that when unforeseen circumstances or costs pop up that the overall plan suffers. Consequently, some churches build a facility that they quickly outgrow and are left with many of the same issues they had before they began.

Developing a Master Plan for your space and then executing it in Phases allows for greater flexibility in your building project. 
4) Plan for Project Speed Bumps
